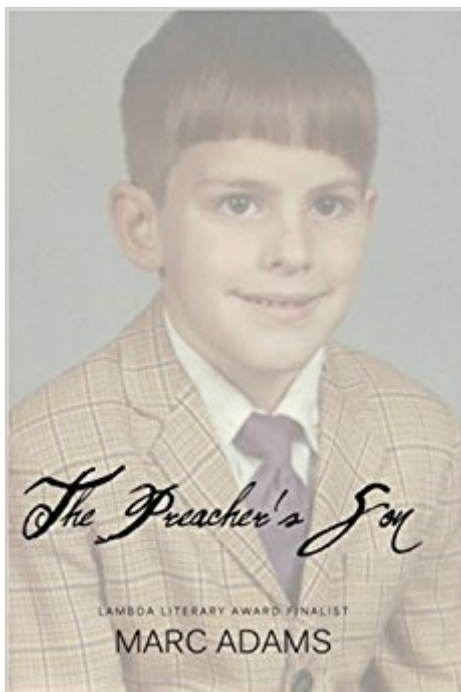


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The Preacher's Son

Marc Adams is the author of nine books including *The Preacher's Son*, his award-winning autobiography, six collections of poetry, and *The Do's & Don'ts of Dealing with the Religious Right*. Reared in a cultish, fundamentalist Baptist home, aware that he was gay by the age of seven and weaving his way through religious schools (including Jerry Falwell's Liberty University) and reparative therapy techniques, Adams started his journey to self-acceptance at age 23. Marc Adams is also the founder and executive director of HeartStrong, Inc. It is the only educational nonprofit in the world with the sole mission to provide outreach and support to GLBT students terrorized at religious educational institutions.

Although for decades I have identified my father as a Fundamentalist, or--more specifically--as a Primitive Baptist, Marc's story helped me realize how extremely thoroughgoing my own fundamentalism has been. His writing is captivating and potent. It has the feel of a personal conversation where he bares all (yes; he does) in a compelling way.

The Preacher's Son reads like a movie. A movie that will drag you to hell and back--a harrowing tale of one man's journey through hatred, prejudice, and self-loathing to redemption, happiness, and a new family built on unconditional love. This is a tale that depicts Marc's journey through a world (thankfully) not all of us are accustomed to. There are unfortunately others who still live this kind of life every day. I've heard of a girl at a religious school who, after being found out & expelled went home and, unable to face her family and church, drank a bottle of drano in order to her life. A boy who came out to his father and then was beaten nearly to death by that father, then thrown out on the street. Marc tells his story not only for these people, but for all of us who need to be made aware of the horrible wrongs done in the name of an otherwise loving and forgiving religion. But The Preacher's Son doesn't just show how a young man's life can be made unimaginably difficult by family, clergy, and teachers-- it also shows readers that there is always hope for love, friendship, and family. Anyone struggling with religion and their sexuality will find comfort and solace in this book's pages; anyone who has friends or family dealing with this struggle would benefit from the insights contained therein; congregations would also be well advised to pay attention to the lessons this book can teach. By no means light reading, the Preacher's Son is nonetheless "one hell of a good book" sure to open eyes, inform, and reassure. Adams writes so well that throughout the book his fear feels like our fear, his tears are our tears, his redemption is our redemption, and his final joy is, finally, ours as well. The only shortcoming is perhaps that those who should read it most probably never will.
