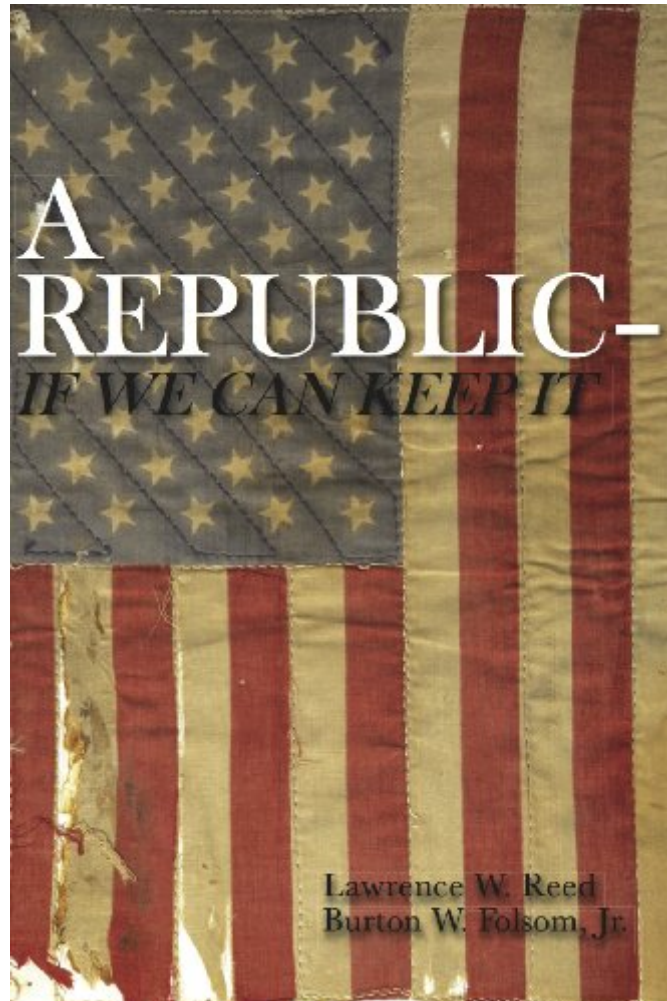




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A Republic—If We Can Keep It

In the past I have enjoyed books written by both authors. This one is no exception. With solid examples the authors easily point out the pros of business versus the cons of big government.
