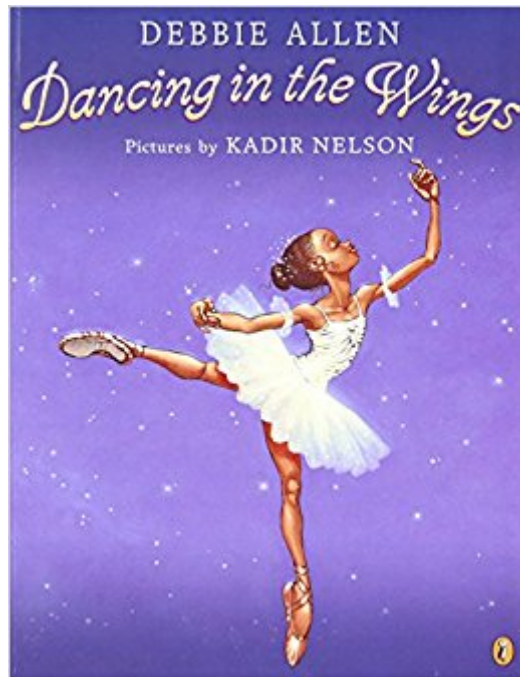

The creators of *Brothers of the Knight* here offer an inspirational story of a hopeful young ballet dancer who complains of her too-big feet and too-long legs: "I was too big for the boys to pick up, and too tall to be in line with the other girls. So I watched from backstage, dancing in the wings, hoping that if I just kept dancing and trying, it would be my turn to dance in the spotlight." Though her brother and several of her peers constantly razz her, Sassy's uncle encourages her to audition for a role in a summer dance festival, asserting, "All you gotta do to make your mark on the world is walk into a room." The director of the festival echoes this sentiment when he announces in the book's foreseeable denouement that Sassy has landed a place in his program. Allen's wordy

narrative occasionally tries too hard to be hip (featuring such slang put-downs as "Your mama" and "Talk to the hand"), but this tale may well boost the confidence of youngsters who share Sassy's lack of self-assuredness. Nelson's animated illustrations depict Sassy with a grace that belies her self-image and that effectively foreshadows the accolades to come. Ages 4-8. (Sept.) My 6.5 year old dancer loves this! It's sweet, funny and encouraging for our little aspiring performers. The young protagonist is teased for being tall but she works hard and her talent is recognized. The book is about feeling different and discriminated against but it's not about racism. The main and peripheral characters are people of color, however, and In this sense, especially with the lovely illustrations by Kadir Nelson, the book is anti-racist and affirming of African-American kids, families and community.

My daughter (7) is very aware of the fact that she is the only black girl in her ballet class and has an inquisitive personality. She will point out things I never noticed, like how the mandatory skin colored ballet tights do not match HER skin tone and that pink ballet slippers are meant for girls with 'pink feet'. I love her observing character and thought she would appreciate the resemblance with the girl in this book (both the spunky character and the looks) but my daughter was only interested in looking at the illustrations. The paragraphs seemed to be a bit lengthy for her attention span, so the message of the book went over her head.

This is the cutest story ever! Any family or culture can relate to its story morale but it is especially delightful for an African American family who enjoy the arts. My daughter just started ballet lessons, so I got her some stories about ballet. This one is our favorite. My five year old and 11 year old girls both enjoyed it. The story is perfect from building self esteem, solving sibling conflict and teaching persistence. Debbie Allen has great story telling abilities (loved all the characters) and the illustrator

did a great job portraying black beauty and I was impressed with the California landscape (e.g. Coolies Caribbean restaurant).

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
